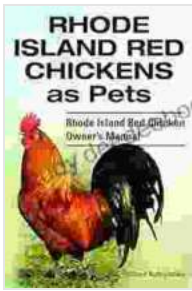

Coop Size

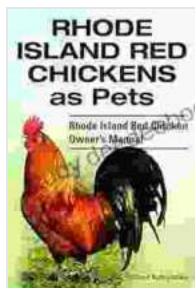
